2014 was a busy year for the Brooksville Police Department, a year in which we handled 31,981 calls for service for our citizens and visitors of the City of Brooksville.

2014 was also another historic year for the City of Brooksville and the Brooksville Police Department. History was initially made on June 30, 2011 when the Brooksville Police Department was awarded Initial Florida Accreditation by the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation. On that day we joined an elite group of proven professional police, sheriff's and state law enforcement agencies in our great state. In June of 2014 the Brooksville Police Department again proved it was amongst the elite of law enforcement by receiving our Re-Accreditation from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation. The Brooksville Police Department was found to be in 100% compliance with 130 mandatory standards of accreditation in addition to 84 optional standards. Florida Accreditation



The Brooksville Police Department attained initial accreditation through the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA) on June 30, 2011.

At the conclusion of a three day on-site assessment for the department's first reaccreditation in April, 2014, the CFA team leader characterized the department as an exemplary law enforcement agency. On June 25, 2014 in Bonita Springs, the full Commission bestowed the first reaccreditation upon the department with the reviewing Commissioner described the three day assessment as "flawless".



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A Sample of Significant Cases



The following pages contain summaries of significant cases investigated by the Brooksville Police Department during calendar year 2014. During that period, the department completed 1,909 police reports; the eight (8) incidents documented here represent a cross section of the most significant and are detailed in chronological order.

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Case 2014-000012, Bomb Threat, January 2

The following is a synopsis of a 41 page police report documenting this incident:

On January 2, 2014 at 1237 hours, 58 year old Mark L. Riley entered the SunTrust Bank at 1 East Jefferson Street, approached a teller and asked to speak with security. When the teller asked the reason, Riley announced that he an explosive device in his backpack and he was going to blow up the building killing all inside. Bank employees called 911. Two Brooksville Police Department detectives were in the immediate area of the bank and arrived on scene within minutes and confronted Riley, who was holding the backpack. At gunpoint, the detectives ordered Riley to drop the backpack and get down on the ground. Riley verbally refused, then in a quick threatening manner, reached into the backpack as if to retrieve a weapon. Riley was tackled by the detectives and taken into custody without further incident. Initial visual inspection of the backpack dictated a call for assistance from the Citrus County Bomb Squad to determine if it contained an explosive device, however, further investigation made it apparent that there was no device within. The backpack contained clothing. During interrogation at the Brooksville Police Department, Riley stated that his intention was to be killed by responding police officers. He further stated that his actions during the confrontation with the detectives were to provoke them to end his life. Chief Turner credited the detectives with identifying the suspect's mental state and the actual threat and taking action to end the incident without the use of deadly force. On July 11, 2014, Mark L. Riley entered into a negotiated plea and was sentenced to 30 months in state prison.

Case 2014-000917, Burglary / Resisting With Violence, March 24

The following is a synopsis of a 29 page police report documenting this incident:

On March 24, 2014 at 2053 hours, officers of the Brooksville Police Department responded to Deli World located at 701 West Jefferson Street in reference to a burglary in progress. Communications advised that a subject entered the business through a broken window and was still inside. Officers surrounded the business and the subject, later identified as 55 years old Michael L. Bell, exited and was met by an officer on the east side of the building. The officer attempted to take Bell into custody at gunpoint. Bell charged the officer and grabbed the officer's firearm in an attempt to take it away from him. The officer was able to retain his firearm while leg sweeping Bell, causing Bell to fall to the ground. Bell quickly got back up in an attempt to flee but was subsequently tasered by another officer. Bell continued to resist by refusing to place his hands behind his back and was tasered again because his hands were covered in blood from crawling in and out of the broken window and the officers were unsure if he was armed. After the second taser use, he then complied and was handcuffed without further incident. Bell received medical treatment for his cuts and was transported to the

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Hernando County Jail where he was charged with burglary to a structure, resisting with violence and resisting without violence. On April 16, 2014, Michael L. Bell entered into a negotiated plea and was sentenced to 28 months in state prison.

Case 2014-001526, Homicide: Aggravated Manslaughter, April 28

The following is a synopsis of a 172 page police report documenting this incident:

On April 28, 2014 at approximately 0900 hours, Brooksville Police and Fire Rescue units responded to a 911 call to 385 Union Street in regards to a newborn child who was not breathing. Responding officers attempted CPR until fire personnel arrived. A short time later the child, a full term baby girl, was pronounced deceased at the scene. Through their investigation, detectives determined that the child's mother, 27 years old Maria M. Castillo had given birth to the child a few hours earlier while taking a shower. Castillo admitted that she failed to notify family or emergency personnel of the birth, but instead placed the newborn in a bathroom trash bag and took the child into her bedroom. For over approximately the next hour, the child remained in the trash bag, lying on the floor partially covered by clothing to conceal her from view. Eventually, Castillo's family learned of the child's birth and called 911 for assistance. Based on interviews and further investigation by detectives and the Medical Examiner's Office, Castillo was taken into custody on July 12, 2014 and charged with one count of Aggravated Manslaughter of a Child. As of this printing, she has been released to her family and is undergoing state supervised mental evaluation.

Case 2014-001858, Traffic Crash, May 13

The following is a synopsis of a 70 page police report documenting this incident:

On May 13, 2014 at 0810 hours at the intersection of Broad and Main Streets, a traffic crash took place involving six vehicles including a Brooksville Police Department marked patrol vehicle (see photo on page 8). The patrol vehicle was the fifth vehicle stopped for the red light facing east at the aforementioned intersection. A 1994 Ford F150 pickup truck driven by 25 year old Catlin J. Nichols failed to stop and while traveling some 35-55 miles per hour struck the police vehicle which started a rear end chain reaction with each of the other four stopped vehicles being impacted. The police officer, who was wearing her seatbelt, was airlifted to the hospital. The department vehicle sustained heavy damage and was totaled. The officer returned to duty within a few days and the driver, having fallen asleep at the wheel while returning from his night job, was issued a citation for careless driving. On June 19, 2014, the department's Vehicle Damage Review Board, after considering all the facts, determined without dissent, that the crash was non-preventable with regards to the officer's participation.

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Case 2014-002135, Arson and Battery on a LEO, May 29

The following is a synopsis of a 54 page police report documenting this incident:

On May 29, 2014 at 1039 hours, officers of the Brooksville Police Department were dispatched to 10 Natelle Avenue in reference to a suspicious incident. Upon arrival, the officers observed pieces of furniture thrown out the front door and 65 years old Craig A. Keathley sitting in a chair in the driveway. An officer made contact with Keathley and after a brief discussion, Keathley was asked to place his hands behind his back. A struggle ensued during which Keathley attempted to take the officer's firearm and radio. As the altercation continued, Keathley did get the officer's radio. After repeated warnings, Keathley was tasered and compliance was gained. Subsequent investigation revealed that Keathley set several fires within the home that does not belong to him. A records check revealed that he had an open warrant in Pasco County for battery on a law enforcement officer. Keathley was arrested and transported to the Hernando County Jail without further incident and held on \$37,500 bond. On September 19, 2014, Craig A. Keathley entered into a negotiated plea and was sentenced to 4 years in state prison.

Case 2014-002210, Fleeing to Elude and Battery on a LEO, June 4

The following is a synopsis of a 61 page police report documenting this incident:

On June 4, 2014 at 1851 hours, a marked Brooksville Police Department vehicle traveling northbound on Broad Street was passed by a silver Mercedes in excess of 90 miles per hour. The officer activated his emergency equipment in an attempt to initiate a traffic stop. The vehicle failed to stop and accelerated speed continuing northbound on Broad Street. The vehicle swerved in and out of traffic and ran the red light at Cortez Boulevard and Broad Street. The suspect vehicle continued north where it collided with a stopped vehicle at Main and Broad Streets. The vehicle turned around, fled the scene of the traffic crash then proceeded southbound in the northbound lane. The suspect then intentionally struck a marked vehicle that was stopped in the roadway with its' emergency lights activated. After colliding with the marked police vehicle, the suspect fled on foot. He was apprehended by K-9 Titan and other officers. During the arrest, the driver, later identified as 26 years old Joseph Villarrubia, struck the K-9 with a closed fist and swung at the K-9 handler. During a post-Miranda interview, Villarrubia stated he was having a difficult time in his life and had an argument with his girlfriend. He said he chose to challenge law enforcement. He was arrested and transported to the Hernando County Jail and held on \$22,500 bond. As of this printing, this case has not gone to trial.

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Case 2014-003483, Homicide: 1st Degree Murder x 3, August 8

The following is a synopsis of a 559 page police report documenting this incident:

On August 29, 2014 at approximately 2049 hours, officers of the Brooksville Police Department responded to 820 Peach Street in reference to a shooting. Upon arrival, officers found three deceased gunshot victims, a 36 year old female in the roadway, a 29 year old male inside the residence and an 81 year old female inside the residence. A fourth victim, a 33 year old male was located a short distance from the residence after he fled from the Peach Street address during the shooting. The fourth victim was chased down and shot multiple times by the shooter. The shooter was identified as 42 year old George Mason III. He was struck by a passing motorist after he shot the fourth victim on Dr. Martin L. King Jr Boulevard. Mason sustained serious injuries and was transported to Bayonet Point Hospital. The fourth victim was also transported to Bayonet Point Hospital in critical condition. He later recovered from multiple gunshot wounds, including wounds to the head/face, upper body and shoulder. Mason recovered from numerous broken bones and internal injuries. The firearm used in the shooting, a 9mm handgun, was recovered at the scene. Three of the victims resided at the Peach Street residence while the female victim found in the roadway resided with the shooter in a Lutz, Florida residence. There were numerous witnesses to the shooting to include residents of the Peach Street address. Mason was charged with three counts of 1st degree murder, attempted murder and felon in possession of a firearm. At the time of this printing, the case has not gone to trial.

Case 2014-003719, Baker Act and Battery on LEO, September 13

The following is a synopsis of a 71 page police report documenting this incident:

On September 13, 2014 at approximately 2056 hours, officers responded to 7119 Daffodil Drive in reference to a trespass complaint from a property owner. Upon arrival, the complainant advised that 38 year old Phillip G. Napier was under the influence of narcotics, was on his property and had refused to leave. The complainant requested that police have Napier removed from the property. The property owner and Napier are related. Napier had locked himself in a shed adjacent to the residence. When requested to leave by the officers, he refused to open the locked shed door and was acting paranoid, delusional and aggressive towards the officers. During the officers' investigation, Napier became increasingly violent and committed the offense of Battery on a Law Enforcement Officer by kicking officers in the chest and groin. He armed himself with a knife in an attempt to harm the officers. Napier was disarmed by an officer, but continued to resist with violence by kicking, screaming, squirming and refusing to comply with handcuffing attempts. At one point of the violent encounter, an officer utilized his Taser, which had no visible effect on Napier. While wrestling on the ground, Napier attempted to forcibly take the Taser from the officer. At one point,

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Napier and the officer had dual possession of the Taser, but the officer regained full control. Officers called for backup and additional officers arrived and assisted in handcuffing Napier. After he was handcuffed, Napier appeared to lose consciousness. Officers immediately rendered medical assistance to include CPR and were able to revive Napier. Fire Rescue was called to the scene and Napier was transported to Bayfront Health Hospital where he remained under care for some time. A warrant was issued for Napier's arrest for Battery on a Law Enforcement Officer, two counts of Resisting with Violence and Depriving an Officer of Means of Protection. His bail was set at \$17,000. Napier was arrested on March 21, 2015 pursuant to the warrant but has not gone to trial.

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Goals and Objectives

The greater the understanding of what the department hopes to accomplish, the greater will be the chances for success. It is important that all members of our organization be apprised of department goals and objectives and how these goals and objectives will be accomplished.

It is the policy of the Brooksville Police Department that during the month of January the Chief will call a meeting of all staff supervisors to discuss and set the coming years' goals and objectives. A written report will be made containing these goals and objectives and will be provided to the members.

The Chief of Police, with the concurrence of the City Manager, has identified the four (4) most important objectives for the Brooksville Police Department for the period 2014 through 2017 as follows:

Strategic Plan for 2014-2017

- (1) Continued enrollment in the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation program with the ultimate goal of achieving a second reaccreditation in June 2017.
- (2) Continued revision and review of department policies and procedures in accordance with applicable Florida law and accreditation standards.
- (3) Continue to review and when needed upgrade equipment to provide a safe and efficient environment for all employees in the furtherance of our duties.
- (4) Initiation of a professional development program whereby patrol officers are temporarily assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division for periods of at least three months for cross training. Such an upward mobility initiative will enable career development opportunities, expand patrol officer skills and ultimately improve the level of service provided to the citizens of the City of Brooksville.

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Crime Statistics

Uniform Crime Reports and Clearance Rates

Uniform Crime Reports (UCR) track the following offenses:

- murder,
- manslaughter,
- forcible rape,
- aggravated assault,
- burglary,
- larceny-theft and
- vehicle theft.

UCR offenses generally decreased in January through June of 2014 as follows; FDLE statistics are not available for the entire year as of this publication.

In criminal justice, the term “clearance rate” refers to the ratio of reported cases to cleared cases. “Cleared” means one of several things:

- cleared; warrant issued (police know who did it, court issues warrant)
- cleared by arrest
- cleared by death of offender (you see this in a murder/suicide, police know who did it, but the offender is dead)
- cleared by exception (case may not be solved, but there will be no further work done on the case because :
 - prosecutor declines to accept case
 - no victim/witness cooperation (victim refuses to be interviewed, give statement or assist in prosecution)
 - inactive (which means all investigative leads have been followed, but nobody knows who did it or can identify the suspect. Can be re-opened if further leads or information is developed)


Value of property stolen in Florida during January through June 2014 totaled \$580,867,001 of which \$140,318,760 was recovered (24%).

Value of property stolen in Brooksville for the entire 2014 calendar year totaled \$158,925 of which \$37,852 was recovered. Stolen to recovered value percentage was 24%.

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Crime Statistics

As of the time of publication of this year's annual report, FDLE had not released its' crime clock for calendar year 2014.



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Car Accident Responsibilities

The Florida Legislature modified Florida State Statute 316.006, effective July 1, 2012 to expand the circumstances whereby a traffic crash report would be required.

In July 2012, the Brooksville Police Department published new written guidelines pursuant to the new law which required that every traffic crash would generate a case number and a completed report. Full detailed reports, referred by the Florida Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) as long form traffic crash reports must be completed in the following circumstances:

- Crashes involving death, injury or complaints of pain or discomfort
- Crashes involving property damage or driving under the influence (DUI)
- Crashes rendering a vehicle inoperable and requiring a wrecker to remove the vehicle from the scene
- Crashed involving a commercial motor vehicle

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The Florida DMV has provided the following information for citizens involved in a traffic accident.

What to Do in a Florida Car Accident

Florida has close to 250,000 vehicle crashes every year. Accidents happen, so it is a good idea to know what the law requires of you if you are involved in a motor vehicle crash. First and foremost you must stop. If there is injury, you are required to call for help. In addition you must give your name, address, and vehicle registration number to others involved in the accident.

Don't Leave the Scene

If you leave the scene of an accident that involves injuries without providing your information you are subject to arrest, and your license may be revoked.

Report the Traffic Accident

Any car accident that involves injuries or property damage over \$500 must be reported. In these situations you should call the local police department, the county Sheriff's office, or the Florida Highway Patrol.

Don't Block Traffic

If traffic is being blocked by your car you must move it. If you can't move it yourself, you are required to get help or call a tow truck. Your car should never block traffic in any situation.

Ticket and Traffic Court

Many accidents are caused by a driver that broke traffic laws. If that is the case then an investigating officer will file charges against the offending driver. If you are charged in a traffic accident you will have the opportunity to explain what happened in court. Then the traffic court will decide what the penalty is. In many cases you will be required to complete a Traffic Collision Avoidance Course (TCAC).

Traffic Collision Avoidance Course

A TCAC course is a Florida traffic school course designed to remind drivers of safe driving techniques. It can be completed online, in a classroom, or with a video. When you complete your TCAC course you will receive a certificate from the course provider that you must deliver to the court. The Florida Drivers Association offers a TCAC traffic

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course online and on video. If you would prefer to attend a classroom then look in your local yellow pages under driving instruction.

Auto Accidents with an Unattended Vehicle

If you hit a car, truck or other vehicle that is parked with no one it you must inform the owner. Leave a note with your name, address, and license plate and report the accident to local police, sheriff, or Florida Highway Patrol.
